The cornerstone of Proyecto Azteca is its Self-Help New Construction Program, through this program, low income families from Hidalgo County colonias are brought together to build their own homes under the supervision of experienced construction trainers. The "tanda" or group will work together from 8 to 10 weeks until everybody's homes are completed. The house is designed for mass production at extremely low price. Proyecto Azteca's house

model includes all the basic features of a standard unit and meets all standard construction codes. Over the years, Proyecto Azteca has gradually increased its production rate and its present construction capacity goal is 50 families per year. Today Proyecto Azteca is a nationally recognized, community-directed, self-help housing organization that has financed and trained more than 600 families in the construction and first time ownership of their own homes in over 150 Hidalgo County colonias.
